#### COMMUNITY GROUPS

Yoga has existed for over 3,000 years. Ancient teachings were passed down verbally until Pantanjali wrote the Yoga Sutras in approximately 400 CE.

Yoga originally began as a meditation practice to help balance the mind through calming the nervous system. Asanas, also known as postures, were developed to prepare the body for the inward journey of meditation.

In modern classes we practice the postures using breath work, alignment, and meditation. These techniques help to quiet the mind, reduce stress, and bring physical benefits. The physical benefits of yoga are balance, strength, flexibility, lower blood pressure as well as many others. The beauty of yoga is that it can be modified by the instructor ensuring it is accessible to all who participate. Props are made available such as straps, bolsters, and blocks. #### OUR PARISH Meet Brian & Lisa Gumb



Lisa Margaret was born the youngest of ten children. She was raised in Port Franks, attended Bosanquet Central Public School and North Lambton Secondary School; followed by Lambton College in Sarnia, enrolled in a Pre-Health Science Program.

Employed for 18 years by Victorian Order of Nurses Elgin-Middlesex and Erie-St. Clair in Palliative and End-of-Life Care, Lisa cared for people whose wish was to die at home. In 2010 and 2011, Lisa valiantly cared for her parents in this same way.

Seeking a change in career, Lisa returned to school to complete Human Resources Management, becoming a Coordinator, first at One Care, then Seaforth Retirement Home, and now at St. John's and St. Anne's where she is doing an excellent job.

On top of her office hours, Lisa is a greeter and serves on Chancel Guild, Communication Committee, Event Committee, Ministry of Laity, and Prayer & Care Fellowship. Her calling was clear, even from a young age. Lisa was happiest when she was serving others. Her large family was and still is a blessing. It brings her joy and extends warmth and care to everyone around. And, she has the most contagious sense of humour.

From the time she was 18, the call to serve as a volunteer has never wavered. Nonprofit organizations are as follows: Canadian Cancer Society, Crohn's and Colitis Foundation, Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Association, Hospice Palliative Care Ontario, local schools, churches, hockey clubs, and fair boards. As a young Mom, Lisa founded and facilitated The O.K. Group; a safe space for Moms and Tots, which continued for ten years.

Lisa advocates for the vulnerable and lives her desire to help people in unique ways:

When travelling, she carries a bag of "stuff" with her. When she sees a need, she responds. On a trip to Kamloops, she came across a homeless woman who was in a desperate situation. Lisa returned to her hotel room and gathered up her own clothes. As she gave them away, she heard the thankful words, "God sent me an angel."

In 2016, Lisa came up with an idea to help local women's shelters. We all know this endeavor as 'Helping Handbags'. With support from St. John's church family and the community this initiative has been successful in distributing 864 handbags over the years!

For her 50th birthday, in lieu of gifts Lisa requested items for the homeless. She was pleasantly surprised to receive 34 pairs of socks, 18 scarves, 48 hats, and 36 pairs of mitts. These items are now being distributed throughout our rural communities.

In her quiet time, Lisa enjoys reading and writing. She has completed a memoir titled, 'God Answers Prayers', and is working on a book of short stories titled, 'God at the Bedside' which includes experiences from her career in palliative and endof-life care. In 2013, Lisa met Brian and the couple were later married on our beautiful beach with their 5 children as witnesses. This blended family quickly multiplied to add sons and daughters-in-law, as well as 6 grandchildren whom they adore.

Brian and Lisa are what we like to call "Cradle Anglicans", both of their parents were married at St. George's-on-the-Wye Anglican Church in Thorndale!

When they find spare time, they love to get away on their boat or motorcycle. For them, there are only 3 seasons; BOATING, MOTORCYCLING, and WINTER!!!

**B**rian Edmund was born in London and raised in Thorndale, accompanied by a brother and sister. He attended Plover-Mills Public School and Medway High School; followed by Fanshawe College in Motive Power, and later York University in Business Management.

With the decision to not take on the family construction business, Brian became a Class A Mechanic/Motive Power Technician and obtained his Red Seal License, recognized throughout Canada. He purchased a service repair shop in London that specialized in the refurbishment and repair of classic import cars.

With advice from a close friend, his career took a turn away from the retail sector and landed him in the field of industrial gearing technical sales. His hands-on mechanical knowledge was a unique attribute in the sales field and opened doors for regional sales positions with International gearing manufacturers. These were followed by National Sales Manager positions with world renown manufacturer's; Philadelphia Gear (USA), Santasalo (Finland), and Hofmann Engineering (AUS). These positions allowed for travel throughout the US, Europe, China and best of all, many regions of Canada.

No two days are the same for this traveler as he could be visiting any one of the following

industries: petrochemical, energy, mining, forestry, steel production, automation, and many others, for review of gearing applications. Recently, he has branched out on his own as an independent sales representative under the name of Industrial Solutions of Value Inc. He represents several companies who offer high value, unique industrial products and services.

Obviously, Brian's travel experience is vast, and he knows many of the travel tricks to save time and get to where he needs to be, including remote areas like the gold mines in Northern Ontario. If you want to see how it's done, watch the George Clooney movie 'Up in the Air'.

In 1969, Brian's dad purchased an investment property in Southcott Pines for \$2300. Brian eventually acquired the property and built a house. He was hardly ever home, but it established his interest in our beach town.

Joining St. John's in 2013, Brian was elected to Parish Council in 2016 to oversee maintenance. He was quickly promoted to Deputy Warden and has now completed his 5th and final year as Rector's Warden. His term started just prior to the COVID 19 pandemic, followed by the dissolution of the Regional Ministry and St. Anne's transitioning to a Worshipping Community, as well as the neighbouring land lease, and staffing changes. It is remarkable how he managed his duties within the church and handled a full-time job as well! Brian will now shift 'gears' at St. John's as his desire is to head up a committee for future planning of the property.

Our church family has been blessed. We thank Brian and Lisa for their continued dedication and service to our unique 'little white church with all the flowers'.



Miss a stitch, bait and switch, That is how to scratch your itch. Is it a skein or a ball? That is really not my call.


Try it on, does it fit? Every time she knits a mitt. Sew it up, add a thumb, Then she knits the other one.

#### <u>A TASTY TREAT</u>

#### **BITS AND BITES**

Use 2 large roasters for this gigantic recipe.

Divide the following ingredients between 2 large roasters and mix well.

- 1 large box of Shreddies or Chex
- 1 large box of Cheerios
- 2 large boxes of Captain Crunch
- 1 large bag of pretzels
- 2 cans mixed nuts
- 1 large jar of dry roasted seasoned peanuts
- 2 bags of Ringo or corn chips

Dribble 1 ½ cups of corn oil to each roaster and stir. Then sprinkle 2 packs of dried onion soup mix, one package in each roaster. Mix well. Add 2 teaspoons of Garlic powder if you like garlic. Mix well. Add Worcestershire sauce to taste (optional). Roast at 200 degrees Fahrenheit for 3 hours. Stir every hour. In the last half hour, add:

2 bags of shoestring potatoes, hickory flavoured

Allow to cool and bag.
